to be able to use, go into, or get near something



background (n.)

in a work of art, the area that seems farthest away from the viewer

bookmobile (n.)

a vehicle that is a traveling library





borrow (v.)

to take and use for a period of time before returning



central (adj.)

main or most important

character (n.)

a person or creature in a story

collect (v.)

to get things from different places and bring them together



curious (adj.)

having a desire to learn or know more about something



edit (v.)

to make changes to correct mistakes in the words and sentences of a piece of writing



imaginary (adj.)

existing only in someone's mind



knowledge (n.)

information someone gains from experience or education



lesson (n.)

an activity a person does to learn something



librarian (n.)

a person who works in a library



library (n.)

a place where books, magazines, and other materials are available for people to use or borrow



manuscript (n.)

a text written by hand





monk (n.)

a member of a religious community of men who usually promise to remain poor and unmarried



narrator (n.)

the voice that tells the story

notice (v.)

to become aware of someone or something

packhorse librarian

a person who rides on a horse to deliver books



pattern (n.)

a principle of design; a repeated design

pluck (v.)

to pull something quickly to remove it



precious (adj.)

greatly loved, valued, and important



predicate (n.)

what the subject in a sentence is or does

primary colors

the three colors red, yellow, and blue that can be combined in different ways to make all other colors

problem (n.)

something that causes trouble or worry; a challenge

pursuit (n.)

an attempt to find, achieve, or get something



realistic (adj.)

showing people and things as they are in real life



scholar (n.)

a person who has studied a subject for a long time and knows a lot about it



setting (n.)

when and where a story takes place

solution (n.)

how a problem is fixed or solved

subject (n.)

who or what a sentence is about

time order words

words that describe when events happen

treasure (n.)

something that is very special





wonder (v.)

to have interest in knowing or learning something

adapt (v.)



to change so that it is easier to live in a particular place or situation

appendix (n.)

a section of extra information added at the end of a text



camouflage (n.)

something (such as color or shape) that protects an animal from attack by making the animal difficult to see in its surroundings



creature (n.)

an animal of any type



discover (v.)

to see, find, or understand something for the first time



environment (n.)

the natural world



feature (n.)

an interesting or important part or ability



habitat (n.)

the place where a plant or animal lives or grows





indefatigable (adj.)

able to work or continue to work for a long time without becoming tired

key details

the most important pieces of information that support the main topic

line (n.)

an element of art; a mark on a surface that connects two points

main topic

what a book or a section of a book is mostly about

miracle (n.)

something very amazing or unusual

noun (n.)

a word that identifies a person, place, or thing



observe (v.)

to notice someone or something carefully



predator (n.)

an animal that hunts other animals for food



prey (n.)

an animal that is hunted by another animal for food



pronoun (n.)

a word that replaces a noun

protect (v.)

to keep someone or something from being harmed



research

- **1.** (n.) the activity of getting information about a topic
- 2. (v.) to collect information about a topic from multiple sources



scientist (n.)

a person who is trained in science and whose job involves doing research and solving problems



search (v.)

to carefully look for something



shy (adj.)

feeling nervous and uncomfortable about meeting and talking to people

study (v.)

to read, observe, or attend school to learn about a subject



surroundings (n.)

the places, conditions, or objects that are around someone or something



survive (v.)

to continue to live





textual evidence

information from a text that can be used to support an idea or answer a question

texture (n.)

an element of art; how the surface of an object feels or looks as though it might feel

unique (adj.)

very special or unusual



verb (n.)

a word that expresses an action

adjective (n.)



a word that describes a noun or pronoun

brave (adj.)

feeling or showing no fear; not afraid

breeze (n.)

a light wind





collage (n.)

a work of art created by attaching different materials to a surface

comma (n.)

a punctuation mark that is used to separate words or groups of words in a sentence

composition (n.)

in a work of art, how an artist organizes all the elements of art

direction (n.)

where something points or the path something takes when moving



electricity (n.)

a form of energy that flows through wires and is used to operate machines, appliances, lights, computers, and other technology



energy (n.)

the ability of something, such as heat, electricity, light, or wind, to cause change



gale (n.)

a very strong wind



gentle (adj.)

not hard or forceful



gust (n.)

a brief, sudden, strong wind



harness (v.)

to use something for a purpose



independent (adj.)

not requiring or relying on other people for help or support



magic (n.)

a power that seems difficult or impossible to explain

powerful (adj.)

having or producing a lot of physical strength or force

renewable (adj.)

able to be replaced naturally



sail

1. (n.) a strong, large piece of cloth attached to a ship or boat that catches the wind and helps the ship or boat move across the water



2. (v.) to travel on water in a ship or boat

strength (n.)

- 1. the quality of being physically strong
- **2.** the quality that allows someone to deal with problems in a determined way





turbine (n.)

a machine that produces power through blades that spin by the force of moving water or air



wild (adj.)

uncontrolled or dangerous



wind (n.)

a natural movement of air



windmill (n.)

a structure with parts that, when turned by the force of the wind, provide power for pumping water, grinding grain, or making electricity

clever (adj.)

intelligent and able to learn things quickly



diversity (n.)

the quality of having many types



endless (adj.)

having no end

helper (n.)

someone who helps another person with a job or task





hero (n.)

a person who is admired for great or brave acts



inspire (v.)

to make (someone) want to do something; to give (someone) an idea about what to do or create



medium (n.)

the material an artist uses to create a work of art

motivation (n.)

a force or influence that causes someone to do something

panic (v.)

to be overcome with extreme fear

physical map

a map that shows natural features of the land



political map

a map that shows countries and other features created by people

quality (n.)

a characteristic or feature that someone or something has

reptile (n.)

a scaly animal that has cold blood and lays eggs

scour (v.)

to clean something by rubbing it hard with a rough object

tenacious (adj.)

not easily stopped

trait (n.)

a quality that makes one person or thing different from another





trust (v.)

to believe that someone or something is reliable, good, and honest

versions (n.)

things that are a little bit different from each other, but that have some similarities

villain (n.)

a character whose actions are harmful or bad
